Air crash coalition organizes, sets goals

A group representing survivors of airline crashes and relatives of victims organized over the weekend to prepare a lobbying and advocacy mission for victims of future air disasters.

The National Air Disaster Alliance specified its mission, established bylaws and approved interim leaders at meetings yesterday and Saturday at the Pittsburgh Green Tree Marriott.

The three dozen people at the meetings were affected by 11 airline crashes. Six of those were USAir mishaps, including the crash of Flight 427 in Hopewell in September 1994.

The members of the Flight 427 Air Disaster Support League were instrumental in creating the new coalition, which includes representatives of different groups that had

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- Accidents in US or territories
- Domestic and Foreign air carriers
- Major loss of life

NTSB <u>coordinates</u> and provides <u>additional resources</u> to the airline/rail carrier and local government to help victims and their families while preserving local responsibility and jurisdiction

Family assistance does not provide...

- "Closure"
 - Step in the grief/recovery process
 - "Resiliency"
- All the answers
 - Factual information when available/allowable
 - Information on process when no factual information available
- Support for all needs
- Elimination of legal actions

Asiana Consent Order

- \$500,000 civil penalties
 - \$400,000 penalty
 - \$100,000 credit for costs sponsoring multiple industry-wide conferences/ training sessions to provide lessonslearned
- Three areas of noncompliance
 - Publication of reliable toll-free number and staff to take calls
 - Notification to families as soon as practicable
 - Sufficient resources to carry out the plan

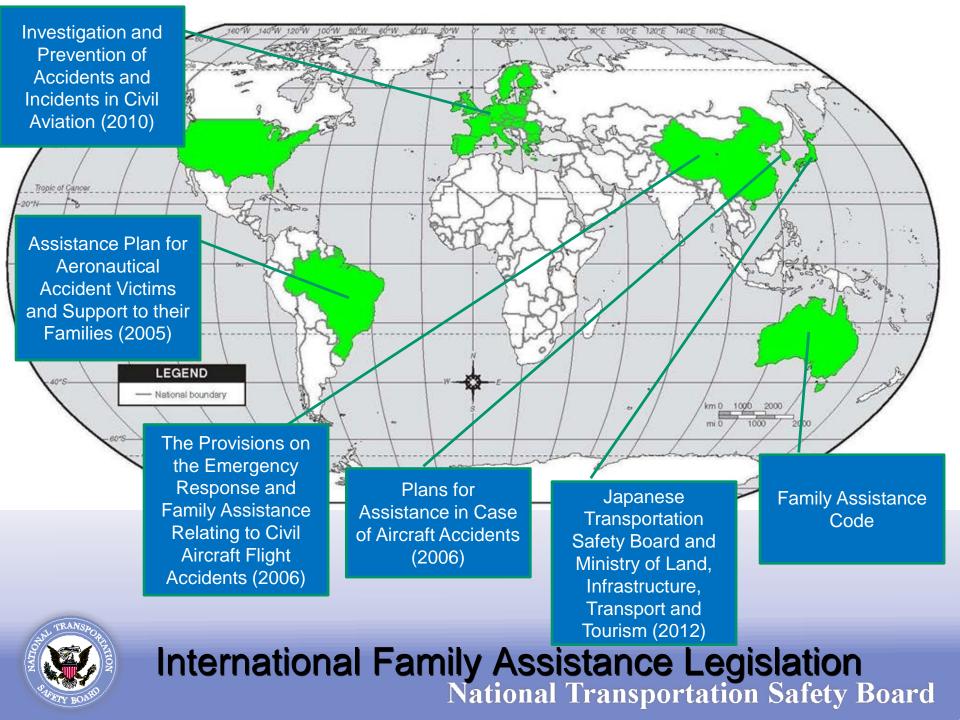


Why does this work in the US?
